OpenAgent valuation; the valuation for the 146 Murwillumbah Street marked with '\*\*' is probably for the whole TAFE site, not just the lot owned by Charlotte Higgins. The present-day addresses have been determined by reconciling information available on the NSW Land Registry Services Online This is the last instalment about Charlotte Higgins. The table on this page lists her property holdings at her death and their value in 1914 as itemised of her property holdings and, where available, a valuation from the OpenAgent website (using CoreLogic data). Items marked with \*\* do not have an Portal and Historical Land Records Viewer. It is no wonder the Tweed Daily wrote that 'Murwillumbah might have been appropriately named The colour coding of the rows shows each child's inheritance. From oldest to youngest, with their age in 1914: Clara Charlotte Osborne (45); Alice The table also shows the distribution in the will of these properties.
